From Rev. Laura

When I was younger, I struggled the most with the stories about Jesus' resurrection appearances. Why didn't anyone recognize him? No explanation would satisfy. I've learned a little since those questions first came to me.

First, I've never found that God answers my "why" questions. God will always answer "how" but is stony silent on any "why" question I might toss out. I simply will never know *why* no one could recognize the resurrected Jesus.

Second, I've learned that we humans can choose not to see something even when it's right in front of us. Our capacity for self delusion is amazing!

So my heart resonates with Thomas in this Easter season, who is honest enough to say that he cannot believe unless he sees and touches Jesus' wounds for himself. Hearsay isn't going to do it for Thomas. Eight days later Jesus shows up and invites Thomas to do exactly that – see and touch him. (John 20:24-27)

Debbie Blue suggests for us that "there's something incredibly vulnerable about this story from both sides: what Thomas needs and what Jesus is willing to give to be known. Jesus gives his breath and gives his body to be (touched)." Jesus (she goes on) recognizes "needing is essential to being human" and Jesus will stop at nothing to meet us in our condition. (Blue, Debbie "Living By The Word" *The Christian Century* 3/25/08, p. 20)

On the first Easter, God reaches into this world and hauls Jesus back to life. On the first Easter, God guarantees the renewal of our human life through staying in constant, unyielding relationship with us and proving that nothing, even the ugliness of the cross, will be able to separate us from God's love.

In this Easter season, miracles still happen. It is possible for you, for me, to believe that our lives can be transformed when we recognize the risen Jesus once more in our midst, and exclaim with Thomas, "My Lord and my God!" In this Easter season, it is still possible "that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." (John 20:31)

Won't you come home this Easter season, to the God who loves you? Won't you come home this Easter season, to the One who brings out life from death, hope from despair, meaning from chaos? Won't you come home this Easter season? Join us on Easter Sunday, April 1st, at 6:45 in the park or 10:00 AM in the sanctuary.

Stay Safe During Spring Cleaning

As you begin spring cleaning and working on the yard follow these simple tips to keep you and your family safe:

- Poison Help Line 1-800-222-1222
 - When accidents happen with chemicals or medicine, call Poison Help 1-800-222-1222. Get help right away from a nurse, pharmacist, or other poison expert. If someone has trouble breathing, call 911 or your local emergency ambulance number right away.
 - Keep poisons in the containers they came in. Do not use food containers (such as cups or bottles) to store household cleaners and other strong chemicals.
 - Store strong chemicals away from food. Many poisonings occur when one product is mistaken for another.
 - Never mix chemicals. Doing so can create a poisonous gas.
 - Turn on fans and open windows when using strong chemicals.
 - When spraying chemicals, direct spray nozzle away from people and pets.
 - Discard old or outdated products. First aid advice on containers may be incorrect and outdated. Call Poison Help (1-800-222-1222) to double check first aid information.
 - Only experts can tell poisonous mushrooms from safe mushrooms. Poisonous mushrooms, called "death caps," often grow in yards and parks.
 - Pesticides (pest killers) can be taken in through the skin or inhaled. Even leather shoes and gloves do not offer full protection. Pesticides can be extremely poisonous. Stay away from areas that have been sprayed until the spray has dried or for at least one hour.
 - Wear protective clothing when using bug spray or other spray products. Put on a long-sleeve shirt, long pants, socks, shoes, and gloves. Remove and wash clothing after using chemicals.
 - If pesticides are splashed onto the skin, rinse with running water for 15–20 minutes. If pesticide contacts clothing, take off the clothing before rinsing skin.
- It is a great feeling to get the windows open, give the house a thorough cleaning and get working in the yard. Make sure you do so while keeping yourself and your family safe. Further information can be found at www.poisonhelp.hrsa.gov.

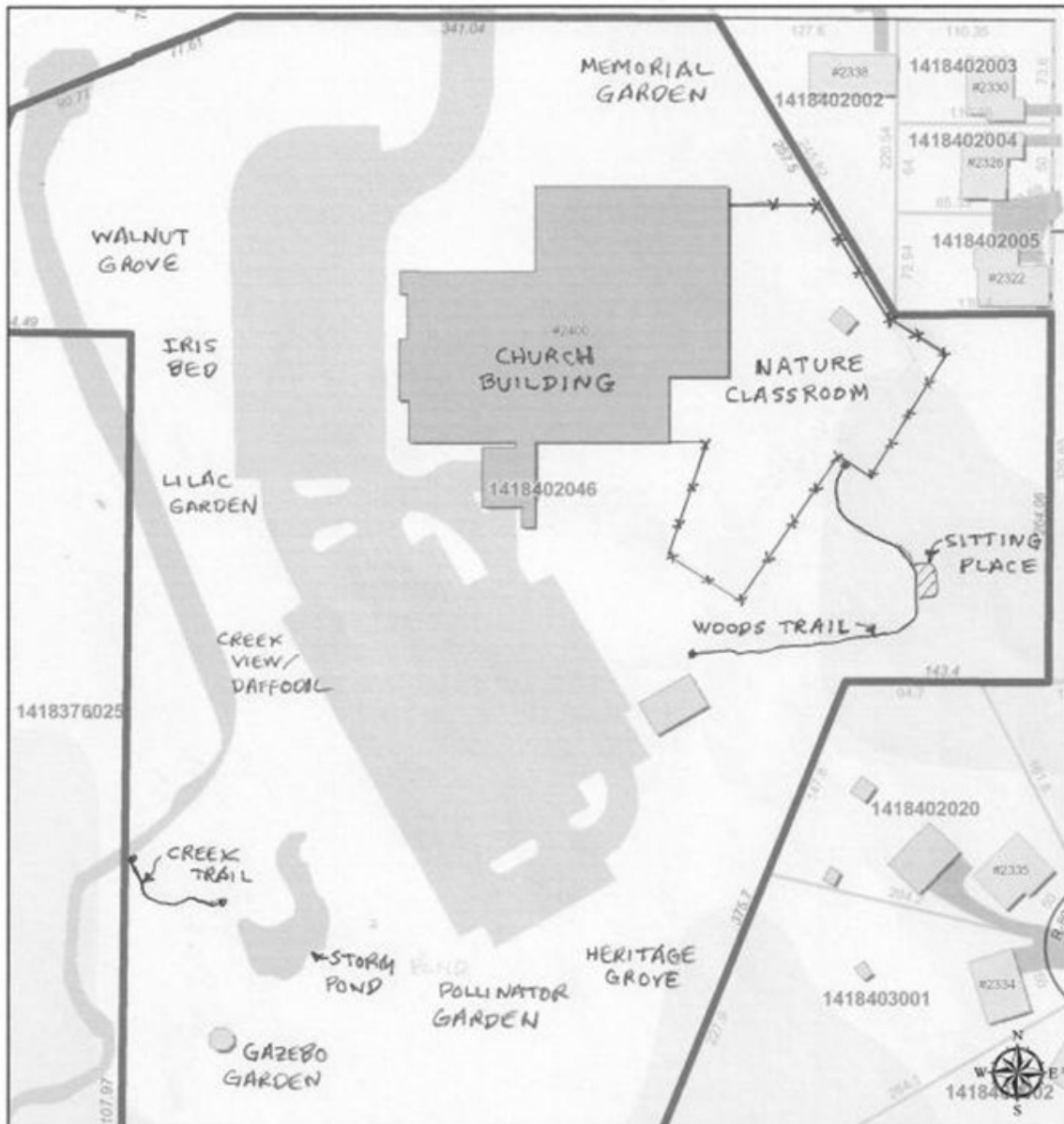


Nature Connections

Get out there! Being in nature reduces anger, fear, and stress and increases pleasant feelings. Exposure to nature makes you feel better emotionally; and it contributes to your physical wellbeing, *lowering blood pressure, heart rate, muscle tension*, and the *production of stress hormones*. In addition, *nature helps us cope with pain*. It may even reduce mortality. We are genetically programmed to find trees, plants, water, and other nature elements engrossing and are distracted from our pain and discomfort. Make sure your kids and grandkids get outside and don't forget teenagers! Nature is an antidote to depression and stress. Our property has wonderful short trails, mulched and weeded. We have benches throughout the property. Next time you are at church, try a short walk or a "brisk sit" outside or come at the end of a busy stressful day. Session Shorts

The Session met on February 20th and conducted the following business:

Received **Nathan and Aryann Brooks** as members by reaffirmation of faith. Their public reception in worship will be scheduled with Rev. Laura. The Session also received the minutes of the 1/16/18 Stated Session Meeting, the 1/21/18 Special Session Meeting minutes, and the 1/28/18 Annual Meeting of the Congregation and Corporation.

The Session also elected Tim Cole as President of the Corporation and as Directors Megan McKeighan, Dave Nixon and Charlotte Cronin, received the Session's annual report and church report filed with the presbytery, and completed the COM exit interview for the last installed pastoral position.

The Session, in order to keep the congregation informed of transitions and changes, approved the following statement for publication in the next issue of the Chimes:

The Session wishes UPC to know that it is the policy of the Presbytery of Great Rivers to not commission ruling elders (CRE) within their home congregations to serve as lay pastors (or commissioned ruling elders). An exception was made in 2017 by the presbytery to commission Karen Miller to UPC for the time period of 7/1/17 – 12/31/17. That commission has now expired, and the presbytery will not renew it. The Session is grateful for the voluntary work Karen performed in the gap time between the departure of the called pastor and the arrival of the interim pastor which her commission allowed her to carry out within UPC, such as baptisms, weddings, and communion services. We affirm her continued employment as our Director of Christian Education and are grateful for the added workload she assumed when we had a particular need. All voluntary matters performed under her temporary commission which Karen may have handled between July and December of 2017, such as receiving new members, conducting marriages and performing baptisms, should now be directed first to Rev. Laura. Her cell is 815-822-0557. Again, the Session is thankful for Karen's dedication and her willingness to voluntarily step up and serve in this way for the gap time.

The Session also approved a silent services auction for the youth to begin on Easter Sunday, April 1, honored Lois Hultgren's written request to be removed from the rolls of the congregation, approved receiving the One Great Hour of Sharing offering during Lent to support the Presbyterian Mission Agency, voted to establish a Safety Task Force and to request a safety assessment by the police department for the church and preschool. The Session also approved the use of the building by the chapter of Moms Demand Action being formed by UPC member Michelle Nielsen Ott.

The Session asked Rev. Laura to gather more information about a baptismal request and a notification of an estate gift, received her written report on where we are in the interim process, received the resignation of Megan McKeighan from the Nominating Committee and adjourned with prayer at 8:30 until the next Session meeting of 3/20.

The Session met on 3/20 and conducted the following business:

Received **Natalie England** as a member by Reaffirmation of Faith. Natalie will be publicly received in worship in April.

The Session approved the minutes of the 2/20 Session meeting and recorded the email vote to approve a card reader on the front (west) interior door. The Session also affirmed the decision to serve Communion on Easter Sunday, decided not to hold a joint meeting of the Session and Deacons in 2018, transferred Paula Evans to FPC, Danville IL at her request, approved the baptism of Layla Romero on April 1st, approved the use of the gazebo by licensed local pastor Danita Parra to conduct the wedding of Heather Armstrong and John Blase on 10/20, approved the use of the sanctuary by Rev. Laura to conduct the wedding of Jill Potts and Jason Shea on 6/2, approved the changing of the 2018 Session meetings to 4th Tuesdays beginning April 24th (except Christmas day) and received informational items.

The Session also removed Don Towery and Judy Martin from the rolls at their request, approved the receiving of an offering in support of Proyecto Amar on Sunday May 6th, approved the use of the church bus as per the bus approval form for Church Life's outing scheduled for April 14th, approved the planting of 2 trees in the Preschool playground area to replace trees removed last fall and approved paying for the installation of the card reader on the interior west door and attendant supplies from the estate gift of Margaret Hochstrasser.

The Session also spent time in conversation about processes for following up with new members about their interests and what might make that more efficient and timely. The Session also discussed further the projected work of the Safety Task Force, the need for planning for one time and continuing expenses related to any upgrades put in place and the larger challenges of safety versus convenience. There being no further business, the Session adjourned with prayer at 8:45 until its next scheduled meeting of 4/24/2018.
